


Earning Money

When you earn money, you are receiving money (or payment) from someone in return for some work or service you provide. People have to work to earn money.

Sometimes, people earn money in celebration of something, like a birthday.

Example: The mail-person earns money for regularly dropping off your mail and packages.






Saving Money

Saving money is when you put your money away to spend it later at another time. Where you put your money, like a bank or an envelope, is up to the individual person.

Example: Do you have a piggy bank? If so, every time you put coins in there, you are saving it to use at a later time.






Spending Money


When you pay for something, that is you spending money. We spend money on things we need, as well as things we want.

Example: When you and your family buy groceries from the store, you are spending money to receive that food.







APPENDIX: Resources and Activity Worksheets

Slide 8: Is it Saving or Spending?

Either as a class or in pairs, have students choose whether or not the event in the picture is depicting "saving" or "spending." Discuss the results all together.

Slide 9: Think, Pair, Share

Designate one side of the classroom as the "Spending Money" side, and the other as the "Saving Money" side. Next, hand out the worksheets that have squares depicting various scenarios. Have students cut out the squares, and then place them on the corresponding side to which it relates. This can be a solo activity, or students can pair up to share and listen to each other's thoughts.
